This year, IFSU recorded 2nd among state universities and colleges (SUCs) in the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) and 89th among 366 higher Leducation institutions in the Philippines. This is a significant improvement from IFSU's 2017 ranking of 159th.

The Webometrics Ranking of World Universities is an independent ranking system by the Cybermetrics Lab, the largest public research body based in

n an effort to preserve the rich heritage and provide sustainable **L** economic opportunities, the Rattan Weaving Training Program was launched on August 18 at the Ifugao State University (IFSU) - Hapao Campus. Funded by IFSU, this event marked a significant step towards cultural preservation and community development which are crucial in the attainment of Sustainable Development Goals 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth, and 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities.

Dr. Generose S. Ognayon, Campus Executive Director, expressed optimism about the program's ability to refine participants' artistic and craftsmanship skills, better preparing them for the challenges of a diverse society.

Hungduan Municipal Mayor Casan P. Dumulag, represented by Minda Aliguyon, pledged support for the program and encouraged participants to create high-quality crafts. They also promised to assist in the marketing of the woven rattan products. Councilor Pablo M. Cuyahon, tourism committee chairperson, stressed the importance of mastering rattan weaving as an additional source of income.

the International Partnership for Satoyama Initiative as a result of the university's Ifugao Satoyama Meister Training Program, which builds human capacity for heritage conservation. IPSI is a global network of more than 300 organizations that promote the sustainable management of socio-ecological production landscapes and seascapes (SEPLS). SEPLS refers to landscapes and seascapes that encompass both natural and humanmodified ecosystems, where traditional and local communities have long-established relationships with their environments.

The partnership aims to engage different regions to foster a global perspective on the sustainable management of landscapes and seascapes in significant SEPLS areas and communities, such as Japan, Indonesia, Thailand, Brazil, Peru, Kenya, India, the Philippines, and many others.

Capping the network's assembly was the 9th Global Conference of the International Partnership of the Satoyama Initiative on July 11, 2023, where strategic planning for the adoption of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework was tackled. The Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework is an international agreement under the UN Convention on Biological Diversity that aims to establish global targets and guidelines for biodiversity conservation and sustainable development. The conference also hosted a public forum on youth innovation and SEPLS contributions. //

Tice Presidents for Academic Affairs, Directors for Quality Assurance, University and Board Secretaries, and select faculty members from the six State Universities and Colleges in the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) convened on July 11, 2023 at the Heritage Convention Center of the Ifugao State University - Lamut Campus for an Orientation Workshop on the Guidelines for Reclassification of Faculty Positions in State Universities and Colleges (SUC) and Technical Assistance for Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC).

IFSU University President and CARASUC Chair Dr. Eva Marie Codamon - Dugyon represented by Dr. Mary P. Caclini, IFSU Vice President for Academic Affairs, expressed hope that the guidelines and requirements would serve as "guiding beacons" on the region's path towards excellence, ensuring that faculty positions are appropriately classified and programs comply with the highest standards.

The Commission on Higher Education (CHED) of CAR, headed by Regional Director Dr. Demetrio P. Anduyan, Jr., assisted SUCs representatives in upgrading the guidelines and requirements. Dr.

Dimog, Lamut (Main) Campus Executive Director, encouraged participants to make the most of the training by learning about modern cultivation techniques and best practices that they can apply to their farms and share with the communities.

and pomelo involves a combination of specific techniques and practices such as pruning, grafting, and charcoaling.

Mr. Clodualdo Firme, Project Consultant, and Mr. Marlon Ting, Project Farm Worker, discussed the importance of fertilization techniques as a cornerstone of successful off-season mango production. Both demonstrated mango pruning, grafting, and charcoal making out of the pruned mango branches.

ICDC Director Ryan Tejada said that follow-up training will be conducted soon

to ensure the program's long-term success and sustainability. He mentioned that the students will be tapped in the future through the Community Volunteerism Service to capacitate mango farmers and the community by providing training and technical assistance that will help boost productivity and livelihood.//
