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ot on the heels of its World University Ranking for Innovation earlier this year, Ifugao State University (IFSU) added another feather to its cap by entering the UI Greenmetric World University Rankings (UIGWUR) 2023. IFSU ranked 2nd in the Cordillera, 21st in the Philippines, and top 1000 in the world in UIGWUR. IFSU also stood out as the only state-funded institution in the region to be included in this prestigious ranking.

University President Dr. Eva Marie Codamon-Dugyon witnessed the unveiling of the results firsthand in UIGWUR ceremony held at Abu Dhabi University in Dubai on December 5, 2023. UIGWUR is a ranking on green campus and environmental sustainability of world universities which is determined by six criteria. It was initiated by the Universitas Indonesia in 2010.

In 2023 world rankings, IFSU recorded a total score of 4,220. In the six criteria, the University earned 1,100 in setting and infrastructure, 810 in energy and climate change, 300 in waste, 350 in water, 485 in transportation, and 1,175 in education and research. IFSU gained higher scores in two criteria: setting and infrastructure, where it ranked 4th, while education and research placed the university at 12th among all listed Philippine universities.

University President Dr. Dugyon expressed immense pride in the news, crediting the University's remarkable success to the "IFSU team who promptly responded and supported my immediate call to work on this undertaking just days before deadline." She further lauded the Commission on Higher Education's invaluable support in facilitating internationalization efforts, a key factor in propelling IFSU's global recognition. "This (achievement) manifests your

commitment and support to our leadership." Dr. Dugyon stated in a social media post. "May our global ranking inspire us more to continue improving, striding forward, and creating positive impact for Gods's glory. We're ending the year with gratitude."

The UI Greenmetric analyzes numerical data submitted by participating universities to generate scores that reflect the extent to which institutions are actively implementing environmentally friendly and sustainable programs. Only few Philippine universities, including two from the Cordillera region - IFSU and Saint Louis University - made it onto this world ranking this year. Globally, a staggering number of universities participated in the rigorous assessment process.//

Weaving workshop part of IFSU heritage preservation project FAITH B. NAPUDO

n keeping with its vision of becoming a globally recognized university that upholds excellence amidst its rich cultural heritage, Ifugao State University (IFSU) launched the "Tanud di tinanudan (A gift to the generations): A celebration of resilience and continuity of the Ifugao heritage" on Nov. 6.

Spearheaded by the International Innovation Center for Indigenous Studies of the Research and Development Center for the Ifugao Rice Terraces as a Globally Important Agricultural Heritage Systems (R&D Center for IRT-GIAHS), the event

featured a lineup of activities centered on harnessing technology for heritage conservation, digital safeguarding of heritage, and empowering women in heritage conservation.

The initiative aligns with Sustainable Development Goals 11, 5, and 10, emphasizing the importance of preserving cultural heritage, promoting gender equality, and reducing inequalities.

IFSU President Dr. Eva Marie Codamon-Dugyon said the activity series exemplifies IFSU's commitment to safeguarding and

promoting Ifugao's heritage. By engaging students and the community in diverse activities, the University is ensuring the intergenerational transmission of Ifugao's traditions and knowledge.

The first event in the lineup was the heritage weaving and fashion design lecture-workshop, where nine participants from the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Agriculture and Sustainable Development, College of Health Sciences, and College of Education attended.

The activity aimed to encourage youth participation in heritage conservation efforts while capacitating them with possible livelihood activities in the future. Ifugao Satoyama Meister Training Program alumna and Ifugao weaver Stephanie S. Ayahao shared her research titled "Inabol: The weaving culture of Ifugao."

Ayahao's presentation delved into the significance of weaving in safeguarding Ifugao's heritage and preserving the essence of its culture. She explained the diverse applications of weaving materials and demonstrated fundamental weaving techniques.

The students were taught how to wind the threads (mun-pudun) and participated in

the warping process. They were also given the opportunity to weave (mun-abol) as part of the return-demonstration. The participants designed and crafted their own weaves (inabol).

A lecture-workshop on photography and videography dubbed "Indigenous knowledge capture" was also held on Nov.

This workshop aimed to equip students with the skills to document the rich indigenous knowledge and traditions of Ifugao. Students learned how to use photography and videography to create compelling narratives that highlight the importance of preserving cultural heritage.

To further encourage creativity and engagement among students, contests were opened for heritage mobile photography, one-minute video on heritage, five-minute video on heritage, and poetry writing.

These contests provided students with a platform to showcase their talents and perspectives on Ifugao heritage. A heritage exhibit was also held to showcase the outputs from the heritage weaving and fashion design lecture-workshop, indigenous knowledge capture, poetry writing, among others. The winning entries were recognized during the closing ceremonies at the Heritage Convention Center on Dec. 15.//

tudents from the Ifugao State University (IFSU) received educational assistance on November 5, 2023 through the initiative of Senator Imee R. Marcos.

A total of 1,461 pre-identified studentbeneficiaries from low-income families received PhP 5,000 cash each from the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), the agency authorized to disburse the financial aid from Senator Marcos.

IFSU achieves stellar results in November 2023 Licensure Exams FAITH B. NAPUDO

Tfugao State University (IFSU) posted impressive results in the November 2023 licensure examinations, exceeding national averages across three disciplines. In the Philippine Nurses Licensure Examination (NLE), IFSU achieved a 98.08% passing rate, significantly higher than the national average of 80%. The College of Health

Sciences at the Lamut campus delivered an exceptional outcome with 51 out of 52 examinees passing the NLE, including a perfect 100% passing rate for first-time takers.

IFSU's Potia Campus also garnered success in the Midwifery Licensure

Examination, securing a 94.29% passing rate. This result placed them among the top 5 performing schools nationwide. In 2022, IFSU - Potia secured a 94.12% passing rate and positioned themselves as the top 3 performing school in the same

IFSU student wins gold at ASEAN International Students' Day 2023 CLYDE B. PUMHIC

n observance of International Students' Day, Ifugao State ■ University (IFSU) participated in the International Student Seminar and Awarding Day on Nov. 15, 2023. The event was hosted by Universitas Brawijaya in Indonesia and livestreamed globally. It featured a compelling Keynote Message, "Humanity in Crisis: Empathy, Compassion, and Action," delivered by Dr. Imam Muhammad Shamsi Ali, a distinguished US Muslim and Interfaith Leader and a UN speaker. This was followed by a student interaction talk show themed "Global Citizenship and Cultural Competence: Thriving in a Diverse World."

The ceremony also shone a spotlight on outstanding achievements in the ASEAN Virtual Student Opinion Competition 2023 (AVISOC 2023), where Christine Faith D. Gano, a second-year IFSU student in the Bachelor of Science in Information Technology Program at the Lamut Campus, secured a gold medal. With participation from 749 students across 9 ASEAN countries, Gano's winning piece, titled "AI or People," critically examined the implications of AI in journalism, specifically addressing concerns raised by the introduction of AI sportscasters, "Maia and Marco," by GMA Integrated News. Gano eloquently highlighted potential issues such as job displacement, diminished critical thinking, emotional intelligence, security risks, and the peril of

misinformation. Her mentor, Dr. Jo Ann D. Doculan, a Faculty Member of the confidence in IFSU's academic excellence and values, stating, "We are eager to bring our students into the global academic arena."

IFSU student participants claimed 3rd Place in the Project Presentation category at the Online Global Culture Exchange 2023, hosted by Universitas Islam Sultan Agung of Indonesia. This exchange program brought together 173 participants from 13 different countries, representing 41 universities. The winning

team comprised Criszaril N. Uyan, Maricar H. Bengwic, and Rickyziah College of Computing Sciences, expressed Duladul Tid-ong from the College of Arts and Sciences, Cyrus Ray P. Manipon from the College of Education, and Lovelane B. Palatic from the DAT-BAT Program of the Hapao Campus.

IFSU symposium tackles VAW, Role of Social Institutions in Ending the Violence FAITH B. NAPUDO

Ifugao State University (IFSU), through its Gender and Development Research and Resource Center (GADRRC), spearheaded a timely symposium on Violence Against Women (VAW) and the crucial role of social institutions in curbing it. Held on November 28, 2023, at the Luis Hora Gymnasium, the event aligned with the 18-Day Campaign to End VAW, carrying the powerful theme: "UNITEd for a VAW-free PH."

Seasoned social worker Ms. Joseline "Joyce" P. Niwane, drawing from her 39 years of experience and distinguished tenure as former DSWD Undersecretary, shed light on the institutions shaping gender roles and socialization. These include family and community, schools, workplaces, churches, media (television, radio, and print), and social media.

Ms. Niwane expounded into the processes of gender socialization within families, highlighting manipulation, canalization, verbal labeling, and activity exposures. She further discussed the manifestations of gender bias, emphasizing its potential to marginalize and exploit women economically, limit their access to opportunities, and confine

them to subordinate roles.

The impact of gender bias extends far beyond economic and social limitations. Ms. Niwane emphasized the detrimental effects on self-esteem and the lack of control victims often experience. Violence, both physical and psychological, leaves lasting scars on the mind and spirit.

Empowering students is key to breaking the cycle of VAW. Ms. Niwane stressed the importance of fostering welfare, access to resources, critical awareness, participation, and individual control. She outlined actionable steps towards ending VAW, urging participants to: Speak up and break the silence, Educate themselves, Call out Abuse, Challenge harmful stereotypes, Redefine masculinity and move beyond limiting gender roles, Support women's organizations, Develop programs for perpetrators, Demand better responses and services, Push for stronger laws, Promote women's leadership, and Build solidarity.

Mr. Christian M. Salazar, Officer-in-Charge of the Cybercrime Policy and Plans Division (CPPD) of the Department of Information and Communications Technology - Cybercrime Investigation and Coordinating Center (DICT-CICC), focused on cyberviolence against women,

particularly Gender-Based Online Sexual Harassment (GBOSH) as defined by Republic Act 11313 or the Safe Spaces Act.

Mr. Salazar outlined the various forms of GBOSH, including: Online threats and harassment using misogynistic, transphobic, homophobic, and sexist language; Cyberstalking and incessant messaging; Sharing non-consensual intimate photos, videos, or voice recordings; Unauthorized recording and sharing of personal information online; Online impersonation or spreading lies to damage someone's reputation; and Filing false abuse reports to silence victims.

The Safe Spaces Act's reach covers beyond the digital realm, encompassing all forms of sexual harassment in public spaces, workplaces, and educational institutions.

The symposium, attended by over a hundred students from the Bachelor of Science in Social Work and Bachelor of Science in Information Technology programs, as well as representatives from local government units and church groups, served as a valuable platform for raising awareness, sparking crucial conversations, and empowering future social workers, IT professionals, and church leaders to play an active role in creating a VAW-free Philippines. //

Blood typing and blood-letting drive held to promote health awareness and ensure safe blood supply ELMRA M. MATABYE

I fugao State University (IFSU)-Lamut Campus through the University Clinic held a blood typing and blood-letting activity on November 17, 2023, in collaboration with the Rural Health Unit-Lamut and Region 2 Trauma & Medical Center (R2TMC). The event aimed to promote health awareness and ensure an ample supply of safe blood for the community.

A total of 74 individuals, including employees, students, and community members, participated in the blood typing activity. Of these, 62 were eligible to donate blood. The blood-letting drive was conducted in accordance with Republic Act No. 7719, also known

as the National Blood Services Act of 1994, which aims to ensure the effective regulation and availability of safe blood in the country's blood banks. Blood typing is essential to determine blood compatibility and prevent the risks associated with receiving an incompatible blood transfusion.//



IFSU - ATBI trains entrepreneurs on citron lemon marmalade processing ELMRA M. MATABYE

n a concerted effort to boost local entrepreneurship and elevate farm productivity, the Agri-Aqua Technology Business Incubator (ATBI) of Ifugao State University (IFSU) conducted a seminar training on citron lemon marmalade production. The event, held at the IFSU Home Technology Building on November 24, 2023, was participated by 15 local business owners.

ATBI's Project Development Officer Ms. Norma Appoy underscored the significance of the training in empowering the participants with valuable skills. "This initiative aims to equip entrepreneurs with the knowledge and techniques essential for citron lemon marmalade processing and to address issues such as food security, waste reduction, and sustainable practices," she added.

Ms. Linda W. Tagtagon, a faculty member from the College of Agriculture and Home Science (CAHS), who served as the Resource Speaker discussed the importance of Food Preservation and



Fruit and Vegetable Processing, along with the actual processing of Citron Lemon Marmalade. The trainees conducted their return demonstration afterward.

Ms. Tagtagon guided the trainees through each step, from selecting citron lemons to the final bottling process. Following the demonstration, participants successfully produced 36 bottles of Citron Lemon

Expressing their gratitude, participants shared their experiences from the training. Students and faculty gain data science and analytics expertise thru DICT Lecture- Workshop

ine (9) senior students and six (6) faculty members of the College of Computing Sciences (CCS) of the Ifugao State University (IFSU) - Lamut Campus participated in an informative lecture and workshop on Data Science and Analytics conducted by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) – Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) on November 20-22, 2023. This event aimed to provide awareness, skills training, and competency across all sectors of the Philippine society using DICT-developed and/or acquired courseware.

Allan T. Lao, Head of the Technical Operations Division of DICT – CAR served as the resource speaker for the lecture and workshop. He delved into the fundamentals of Data Science and Analytics, providing participants with a comprehensive understanding of this rapidly evolving field.

A key focus of the lecture was an introduction to R, a free, open-source programming language widely used for data science, statistics, and visualization projects. Mr. Lao discussed the versatility of R, highlighting its ability to handle a wide range of data analysis tasks, from data cleaning and transformation to



statistical modeling and visualization.

The workshop provided participants with hands-on experience in utilizing R for data manipulation and analysis. Students and faculty members were guided through various techniques, including data cleaning, transformation, and analysis. They also learned how to leverage different R packages and functions to perform these tasks efficiently.

To solidify understanding of data science concepts and their practical applications, the workshop incorporated real-life examples and hands-on exercises. Participants were tasked

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with applying their newfound knowledge to solve real-world data analysis problems, reinforcing their understanding of the concepts and their practical value.

Following this event, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) will be forged between IFSU and DICT to concretize collaboration in the pursuit of providing and accelerating ICT awareness, literacy, and skills development. This MOU will serve as a framework for future partnerships between the two institutions, paving the way for more initiatives aimed at enhancing the ICT proficiency of the Philippine workforce.//
