

## IFSU rings in 2024 with unveiling of WORLD UNIVERSITY RANKINGS MARKERS FAITH B. NAPUDO

fugao State University (IFSU) kicked off 2024 in grand style, unveiling commemorative markers on January 9, 2024 to celebrate its journey towards becoming a globally recognized university.

Dr. Jeng Jeng M. Bolintao, Director of the Department of Quality Assurance, emphasized that the markers stand as proof of IFSU's solid commitment to both sustainable development and excellent performance in prestigious global university rankings.

Marking a new highlight in IFSU's history, the unveiling ceremony, led by University President Dr. Eva Marie Codamon-Dugyon, showcased two prominent markers in the Administration Building lobby.

These markers show IFSU's exceptional placements in two global rankings. IFSU ranked Top 101-200 range of the World University Rankings for Innovation (WURI) in 2023. IFSU likewise earned 35th in the Industrial Revolution and

42nd in the Ethical Value categories worldwide.

Moreover, IFSU stands among the top 1000 in the 2023 UI Greenmetric World University Rankings (UIGWUR), ranking 21st among Philippine universities. IFSU achieved 5th in Setting and Infrastructure and 12th in Education and Research out of six categories assessed.

Dr. Dugyon expressed heartfelt gratitude to the entire IFSU community, especially those who initiated and contributed to the projects submitted for global rankings.

She underscored the importance of continuous improvement.
"Excellence has no end. It is a way of life. There are levels of excellence because rules, procedures, and trends change. So, we need to adapt to the changing times," stated Dr. Dugyon.

She further emphasized the importance of future-oriented

thinking, stating, "I encourage everyone to have a grasp on future thinking and strategic foresight so we can achieve our preferred future."

The unveiling ceremony also underlined IFSU's reason for enhancing its global stature. "We are applying for international rankings to level up the stature of the institution. By pursuing global recognition, we lift not only IFSU's standing but the stature of all its constituents" pointed out Dr. Dugyon. "Our partners will trust us because of our credibility. As we open more of our doors under the hashtag #BorderlessIFSU, we need to be at a level where we are recognized globally. Our partners look at the ranking of our University before they work with us."

The event was organized by the International Affairs and Linkages Office, aiming to start the year with a global mindset among the IFSU community.//

#### **IFSU INAUGURATES IPTBM BUILDING, unveils ATBI**

I fugao State University (IFSU) took a major step towards fostering Innovation and entrepreneurship in the agriculture, aquatic, and natural resources (AANR) sector with the inauguration of two key projects on January 22, 2024. This event saw the official opening of the Intellectual Property Technology Business Management (IPTBM) building and the unveiling of the Agri-Aqua Technology Business Incubator (ATBI) program marker. These initiatives were funded with a combined P10 million from the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) - Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (PCAARRD).

The IPTBM center serves as a one-stop hub for researchers/incubatees to manage, protect, and commercialize their intellectual property generated from government-funded research. Meanwhile, the ATBI program, spearheaded by the IPTBM center, supports the use and commercialization of mature technologies in the AANR sector through technology transfer and the establishment of viable agribusinesses.

University President Dr. Eva Marie Codamon-Dugyon expressed gratitude to DOST-PCAARRD for their continuous support and for entrusting IFSU with such impactful projects. "The IPTBM center bridges the gap between research and commercialization," she remarked.

Ms. Milagros H. Dulnuan, owner of Ifugao Midland Coffee and an ATBI partner- incubatee, shared her positive experience, thanking the program for enhancing her skills and promoting her products, resulting in increased income. "Their technical and managerial support was invaluable in improving my product label and registering my copyright," she added.

#### IFSU studes probe MEDIA'S POWER, **ROLE IN ENVIRONMENTAL ADVOCACY** at Betelnut Digest

In an effort to promote environmental awareness and action among students, the International Affairs and Linkages Office (IALO), along with the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) and the Department of Research and Development (DRD) of Ifugao State University (IFSU) conducted the Betelnut Digest Session 2: Environment and Media on February 27, 2024.

The event focused on the potential of media, particularly film and social media, in environmental storvtellina and advocacy. It supported Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), 13 (Climate Action), and 17 (Partnership for the Goals).

Scott E. Schimmel, Associate Professor at the University of Hawaii - Manoa, shared his expertise in environmental storytelling through film. He presented a film project showcasing the profound effects of climate change on the people of Vanuatu, an island near Hawaii. He also offered valuable tips on filming, editing, and sharing environmental stories through film.

On the other hand, Dr. Marah Joy A. Nanglegan, Director of the Department of Extension and Training of IFSU, emphasized the importance

of social media platforms in raising awareness and promoting environmental action among young people. She encouraged participants to actively engage in environmental campaians on social media. Also, she highlighted the importance of taking simple actions such as properly folding plastic wrappers to reduce waste and promote responsible disposal.

Nicole Binwag, a third-year BS Psychology student, presented her study on the relationship between social media usage and academic performance which complemented the lecture on the role of social media.

Faculty and students from the Bachelor of Science in Development Communication (BSDC), Bachelor of Science in Psychology (BSP), Bachelor of Science in Social Work (BSSW). and Bachelor of Science in Tourism Management (BSTM) attended the event.

The Betelnut Digest launched in 2020 aims to strengthen research appreciation and create a culture of quality research outputs vis-à-vis the University's goal on strong research leadership and culture.//

n a commitment to fostering a more sustainable future, Ifugao State University (IFSU) held a webinar titled "Information Session on Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Indicators for HEIs" on 23 February 2024. The session, organized by the International Affairs and Linkages Office (IALO), saw the participation of IFSU emoloyees and students.

Mr. Clyde C. Pumihic, International Relations Officer and IALO Head, kicked off the session by underlining the importance of internationalization efforts and SDG-related activities in achieving the University's vision.

The IALO, through Information Officer Mr. Rolly Keth B. Nabanalan, also introduced the SDG Challenge Cup, a University-wide program designed to encourage and measure the impact of SDG-related activities. Open to various stakeholders, the Challenge Cup aims to track progress towards each SDG using a standardized scoreboard.

The core of the information session featured presentations delivered by

designated focal persons for each of the 17 SDGs. These IFSU SDG Focals outlined the goals' respective targets and indicators, which offered insights into how IFSU can align its efforts to meet these objectives. Additionally, they illustrated their points with examples, for a comprehensive understanding of how IFSU can contribute to the realization of the SDGs.

Ms. Marveluz C. Daniels, Head of the Department of Planning and Information Management - Sustainable Project Management Section (DPIM-SPMS), concluded the session by reiterating the University President's directive to align proposed projects, programs, and activities (PPAs) with the SDGs.

The SDGs, also known as the Global Goals, are a universal call to action adopted by the United Nations to eradicate poverty, protect the planet, and ensure peace and prosperity for all by 2030. Recognizing the significance of these global goals, IFSU prioritizes their integration into various University PPAs.//

It represents an investment in the future to elevate the standard of education and safeguard the role of SUCs as centers for innovation, research, extension, and holistic learning experiences. She emphasized its impact on the lives of students, who are the fundamental reason for the existence of these academic institutions. She expressed,

by a live demonstration to solidify understanding for all participants. Additionally, she talked about Crime Prevention Tips for Children and how they can protect themselves from any harassment.

In the afternoon session, Pat. Melody Camhit, representative from the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP), ignited fire safety awareness to the participants. Highlighting the potential dangers lurking in everyday items, she explained how matches, lighters, or candles can quickly escalate into devastating fires.

Going beyond awareness, Pat. Camhit emphasized the importance of avoiding overloaded electrical sockets, and always ensuring gas tanks are properly closed when not in use. She also equipped participants with valuable fire safety measures to remember in case of an emergency. Finally, she guided the participants through a practical demonstration.

The culminating activity of the program saw a heartwarming turnover of books and school supplies to Baang Elementary School. Ms. Jocelyn Bahatan, the School Principal, was represented by Ms. Grace Madam-ot who highlighted the timely provision of books for the school since the reading corner contains printed aids and textbooks in llocano.

Ms. Madam-ot further stressed the transformative potential of the donation "This opportunity may change the status of the school," she shared. "During the reading program competition, the school won, however, we were not able to join the other category because we don't have an existing school library."

This extension activity contributes to Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 4 and 10. By providing access to books and learning materials, it directly promotes literacy and lifelong learning opportunities, key drivers of **quality education** and reduced inequalities.

Moreover, it embodies the spirit of **SDG 17**, showcasing the power of collaboration between institutions and individuals to achieve sustainable development goals.//

to tackle the growing concern of tax evasion.

He explored tax intelligence across Indonesia, Japan, and the Philippines, underlining its crucial role in combating tax crimes.

The lecture exceeded theory, delving into the agencies responsible for intelligence activities, including the National Principles Coordinating Agency (NICA), and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) global principles for combatting tax crimes. Mr. Dwi enriched the experience by sharing his personal experiences and highlighting the unique role appearance and personality play in intelligence investigations. A Japanese video showcasing the real-world consequences of tax avoidance and evasion capped the session, leaving an impression on the aspiring criminology students

Serenity Rae Olnanigon, College of Criminal Justice Education (CCJE) Mayor, lauded the lecture's role in expanding career choices for criminology students. While acknowledging traditional paths, she highlighted the exciting possibilities within the intelligence unit. Her affirmation of the opportunity rang with the shared enthusiasm in the room.

Organized under the Betelnut Digest Research Forum program of IFSU, this activity was spearheaded by IFSU's International Affairs and Linkages Office in collaboration with the CCJE.//

## IFSU, BSU draft GLOBAL PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT with German University for TRANSDISCIPLINARY NETWORKING

fugao State University (IFSU) and Benguet State University (BSU) jointly crafted a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) aimed at implementing a transdisciplinary networking project focused on indigenous knowledge, human ecology, and social work at the Multipurpose Hall, IFSU Lamut, Ifugao, on January 12, 2024, in partnership with the Protestant University of Applied Sciences (EH) in Ludwigsburg, Germany.

The event stemmed from an inception meeting in 2023 involving the respective institutions, during which University President Dr.
Eva Marie Codamon-Dugyon enthusiastically endorsed the proposed partnership. Dr.
Codamon-Dugyon stated, "This year, we anticipate the realization of our established objectives, aimed at bolstering our global presence by leveraging our diverse cultural heritage as a cornerstone for our academic and research branding."

The meeting marked the finalization of provisions and specific responsibilities for both IFSU and BSU, setting the stage for collaborative research and global exchanges. Key highlights of the MOA included human resource sharing, academic capacity-building, the implementation of the Transdisciplinary Intercultural International Partnership Project (TIIPP), and cross-pollination of

## IFSU equips PUBLIC SCHOOL TEACHERS in Ifugao towns with MUSIC INTEGRATION IN CURRICULUM TRAINING

he College of Education (COE) of Ifugao State University – Lamut (Main) conducted a series of training workshops across districts in Kiangan, Asipulo, and Tinoc to capacitate Department of Education (DepEd) elementary teachers with the skills and strategies to integrate music into their classrooms and foster a love for music in their pupils.

Held across Kiangan (December 2 and 18, 2023), Asipulo (January 24-25, 2024), and Tinoc (January 29-30, 2024), the seminar-workshop served as a response of IFSU to a request from a DepEd official for assistance in effectively teaching music elements in elementary grades due to music subject's low Mean Performance Scores.

The training-workshop kicked off with a comprehensive assessment of the teachers' needs to ensure the sessions addressed their specific challenges and preferences. The Public Schools District Supervisors (PSDSs) collaborated with local districts to guarantee smooth implementation.

Resource speaker Benedict N.
Doplah, a COE faculty member,
equipped DepEd teachers with
practical strategies and engaging
activities for teaching music and
integrating it into different learning
areas.

The training saw a significant impact on the participants' confidence and motivation, as expressed in their written evaluations. One teacher remarked, "This training will empower me to teach music even if I'm not a music lover." Another mentioned that through the workshop, he hopes to develop a love for music to teach it effectively.

Further, a teacher stated, "I don't teach music because I don't know how. I am glad I learned strategies here."

Doplah noted that the training went beyond merely teaching basic music skills. He said it provided targeted strategies for effective music education and contributed to the overall academic and personal development of both teachers and learners.

Based on the evaluation report, participants expressed a desire for longer workshops, more hands-on activities, and follow-up trainings. They also lauded the expertise of the speaker, highlighting the positive impact on their own music knowledge and teaching skills.

"Everyone can sing, but teaching music theory requires specific skills. You can't give what you don't have," stated Isabel Chug-e, PSDS of Tinoc.

Meanwhile, Principal Joyce Karen Dulnuan of Tinoc remarked, "This workshop opens minds to appreciate music and integrate it into classrooms, improving student performance."

"This is a chance for teachers to understand music basics and confidently share it with their students," added Principal Alma Bakakew of Asipulo.//

need of the community is changing and that IFSU-Lagawe as an academic institution must enhance extension strategies accordingly.

"Conducting an extension activity can be likened to solving a jigsaw puzzle," she added, citing the design of the program.

Mr. Nathaniel F Dimog, Campus Executive Director of Lamut (Main) Campus was tapped as the resource speaker. He talked about the main reason why extension becomes the bottleneck of every institution, the perspective of extension, and ways on how extension projects will be sustainable.

"Is conducting training an extension? Is giving fertilizers and seeds to farmers considered an extension project?" he started.

Mr. Dimog reiterated that extension is the link between research and client systems and the extension worker serves as the bridge to link the two. He also highlighted the role of SUCs in its capability and authority to be the agent of change.

"We, as agents of change, should guide/explore possible solutions to the immediate needs of our beneficiaries and educate them through extension", he added.

He also emphasized that extension is a form of educating people to rely on the improvement of their lives by themselves, not a system of making them depend on assistance from the government (mendicancy).

"We have to start from what our clients have and develop them on how they can innovate from it" he said.

He ended his lecture by suggesting the adoption of the "Participatory Approach" in conducting extension and how it serves as the key to a successful extension initiative.

On the second day, IFSU Faculty Federation President Mr. Vicente L. Kalaw discussed the Key Result Area II -Research Component. Meanwhile, Dr. Desiree Gume G. Nangpuhan talked on KRA 3 -Extension and Community Engagements tools.

Dr. Nangpuhan furthered that faculty members should do extension primarily because they wanted to see the change in the lives of the stakeholders, and contribute to attaining the
