# EXECUTIVE Summary

The Ifugao State University (IFSU) presents through this Annual Report 2015 its achievements in its continued effort to respond to its mandates as per RA 9720 and the University's Development Plan.

This 2015, IFSU has vigorously implemented its major programs and projects and produced the Major Final Outputs (MFOs) specified as MFO I: Higher Education Services, MFO II: Research Services, MFO III: Technical Advisory Services, MFO IV: General Administration and Support Services.

## MFO I: Higher Education Services

### *Enrollment*

For the SY 2015-2016, a total of 7,334 were enrolled in the 1st semester and 6,885 during the 2nd semester. The decline in number of enrollees during the 2nd semester is a regular circumstance in the university.

Successful enrollment mean in 2015 is 7,105 which is 3% higher than in SY 2014-2015.

### *Graduates*

IFSU produced 1,537 graduates in priority and mandated programs. This is 3 % higher than the 1,496 in 2104. Also, 1,192 are graduates in Priority Courses.

### *Accreditation*

There were 9 course programs that were subjected for evaluation to the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities (AACCUP). Eight (8) of the programs passed and obtained various accreditation levels, two (2) course programs to undergo revisit in area V and has passed the Candidate Status (Administration). As of the year end of 2015, 28 are accredited Levels I-III while four (4) achieved Candidate Level Status.

### *Licensure Examination*

This 2015, IFSU retains its good overall performance in Licensure Examinations having higher rates than the National Passing Rate (NPR).

The actual accomplishment of IFSU is 68% passing rate over NPR of 58%.

### *Curricular Development and Revision*

IFSU sustains a progressive learning environment through constant development and revision of its curricular programs. There were seven (7) curricular programs revised this SY 2015.

## MFO II: Research Services

IFSU remains resilient in its research component despite various challenges. The SY 2015-2016 reveals an upsurge in researches, publications and presentations most especially in National and International arena. The increased veracity of IFSU research has also caused an increase in number of citations of IFSU researches this SY 2015-2016.

Also, IFSU researchers obtained 8 awards from

recognized awarding bodies.

A continuing development is the patenting and copyrighting of R&D works by the Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines (IPO). There are nine (9) Utility Models which were issued certification and two (2) were successfully conferred copyright registry this year in review.

## MFO III: Technology Advisory Services

In the Extension and Training, IFSU has endeavored to capacitate the Ifugao people by extending various trainings and workshops that proved beneficial in the improvement of the lives of the Ifugao people.

## MFO IV: General Administration and Support Services

### *Financial Management*

IFSU has endeavored to address all its concerns through proficient management. It has judiciously disbursed its funds to facilitate and sustain operations of the institution and making sure its stakeholders are well served as evidenced by the university's attainment of its MFO's targets.

### *Good Governance*

IFSU was able to pass all Good Governance conditions and availed of the Performance Based Bonus namely:

- PHILGEPS Postings of big ticket Procurement/Projects;
- Functional and updated Website and
- Presence of an effective Citizens Charter - Liquidation of all Cash Advances in time.

### *Human Resource Management*

A functional human resource has always been the prime focus of the institution. Hence, IFSU has made sure it sustains and enhances its employees through progressive learning by supporting their academic journey to excellence.



*Infrastructure and Site Development*

Significant Infrastructure and site development projects were implemented owing to an increased capital outlay fund of more than Php73M.

*Income Generating Project*

IFSU has managed credibly its Income Generating Projects (IGPs) as it endeavored in intensifying said area drawing a total income of at least P.9M from the generated sales of P6.1M.

**Support To Operations**

*Guidance and Counseling Services*

The University administered 7 career and placement orientations to graduating students and all freshmen. An assessment of key services to students by the Guidance and Counseling Office has shown a satisfactory grade of 92.2% all across the campuses. The Guidance and Counseling Services has a reliable and functional Psychometric evaluation system with its upgraded Psychological Test Materials.

*Medical and dental Services*

This 2015, this area actively supported the health and over all welfare of students by serving a total of 9,302 students patients in contrast to SY 2014-2015 where 5,114 students were served.

*ROTC and CWTS*

Still in command of their good performance, IFSU's ROTC remained strong reinforced by its performance as the first ever back to back winner in the Regional Annual Administrative Tactical Inspection (RAATI) for being Champions for SY 2014-2015 and this SY 2015-2016.

*Student scholarship/financial assistance*

Scholarship performance has been attained this 2015 with 85% or 4,321 of the total student population recorded as scholars under 45 active scholarship windows.

*IFSU Rice Techno Complex Museum*

The keeper of artifacts of a rich historic past, the IFSU Rice Techno Complex Museum modestly achieved the labeling of curio and novelties to impart to the learning public its meaning to a significant past.

The IFSU Techno Rice Complex Museum has also been accredited by Department of Tourism and is now listed as one of the places to visit in the Municipality of Lamut.

*Registrar and Admission services*

Enrollment as well as other services facilitated by this office was generally achieved with a total of 10,043 documents issued for SY 2015.

In view of efficiency of services, the Queuing Management System (QMS) was developed by the Information and Communication Technology Section. The QMS was pilot tested during the 2nd Semester enrollment in SY 2015-2016 which facilitated the smooth flow of transaction at the Registrar.

*Library services*

The upgrading and updating of Library Services is a compelling effort, thus, this 2015, the Library has purchased 2297 books, logged student usage of library at 100%, pursued automation of 9 library systems and noted effectiveness at 3.52%.

*Assessment of student services*

Student assessment of IFSU major services manifested a worthy over- all average rating of 92.26%.

*International services*

This SY 2015, IFSU approved, assisted and sent 48 students of Bachelor of Agriculture Technology (BAT) to their 11-month OJT to foreign field area particularly in Israel. In September 2015, 48 BAT students successfully completed and were accorded their certificate in a formal ceremony in Israel for completing their OJT and came home thereafter.

The University's adherence to President Aquino's utmost advocacy of "Matuwid na Daan" has engendered productive and well performing employees and offices who gained recognition as Best, Better and Good Employees and Offices for 2015 that encompassed financial rewards ascribed in the Department of Budget and Management's policies.

Guided by a clear direction and a solid effort, IFSU shall continue to rise and become an Academic Center of Excellence (ACE). IFSU marks this SY 2015 as another year to reckon with as it moves forward to another beckoning year of 2016.

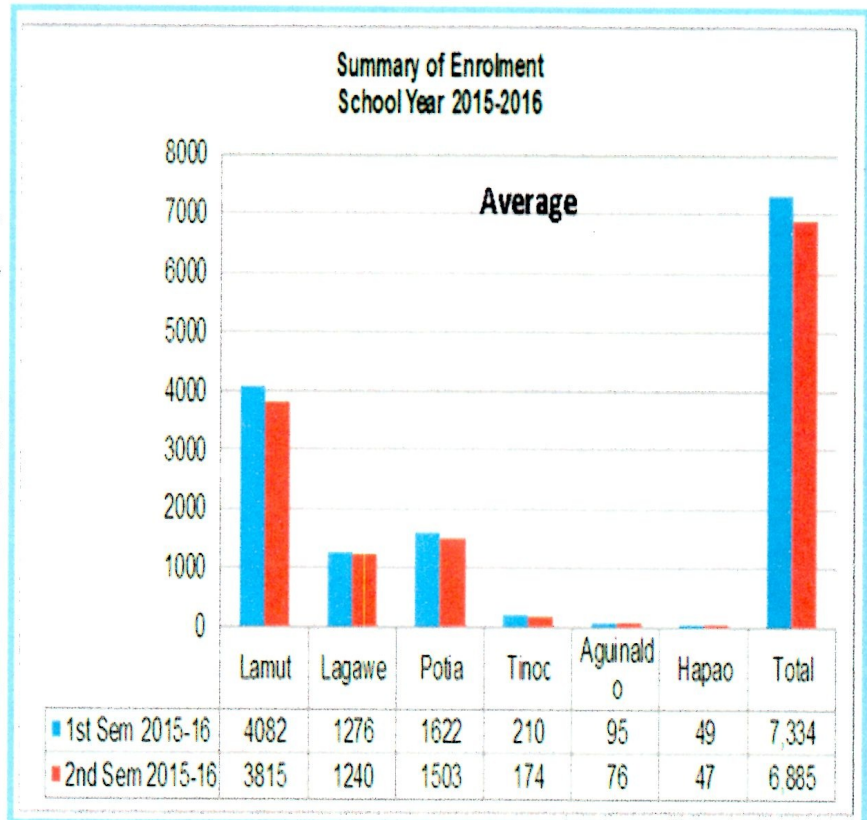
## A. ENROLLMENT

This SY 2015-2016, there were 7,334 (1st Semester) and 6,885 (2nd Semester) enrollees who were registered in the different campuses of IFSU as shown in Graph 1.

Significantly, Aguineldo and Hapao Campuses started operating and admitted a modest number of enrollees in June 2015.

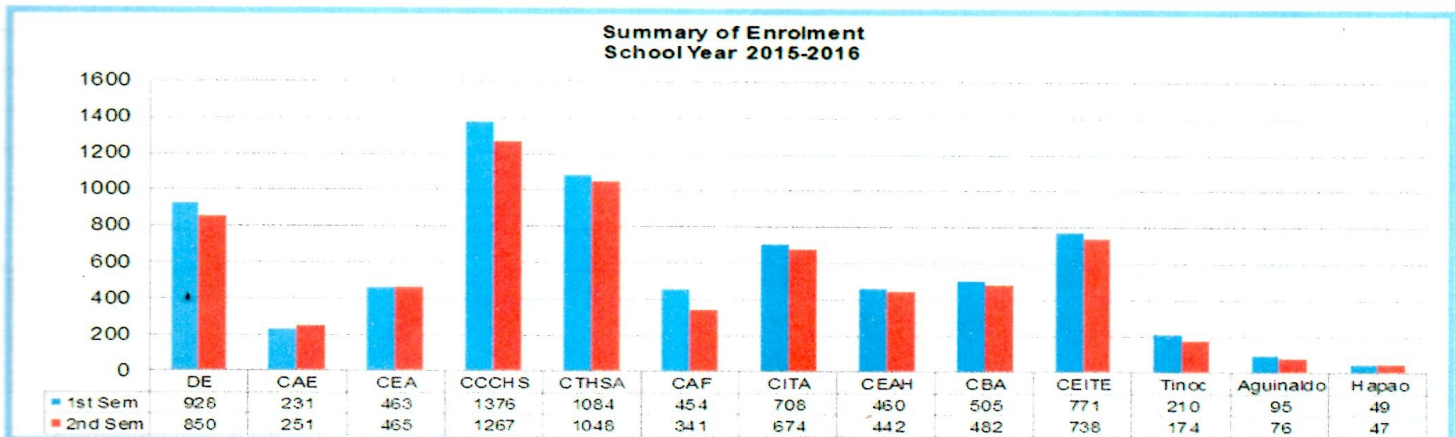
IFSU continued to attract more and more students in the Master's and Doctorate Degree Programs through its Open Distance and Transnational Education (ODE/TNE) approach with two semester average enrollment of 889 students raising the average student enrollment in Advanced Education to 1,130. This year's mean enrollment of 7,105 is 3% higher to SY 2014 mean enrolment of 6,928.

## B. GRADUATES

This 2015, IFSU has produced a total of 1,537 graduates in priority and mandated programs. Compared with target, IFSU's accomplishment rate this year is at 215%.

Respectively, 77.55% or 1,192/1,537 are graduates in the Priority Courses.

Increase in the number of graduates which is 3 % higher than the 1,496 in 2104 was fostered by the improved number of graduates in Bachelor of Science in Criminology and priority ODE/TE programs.

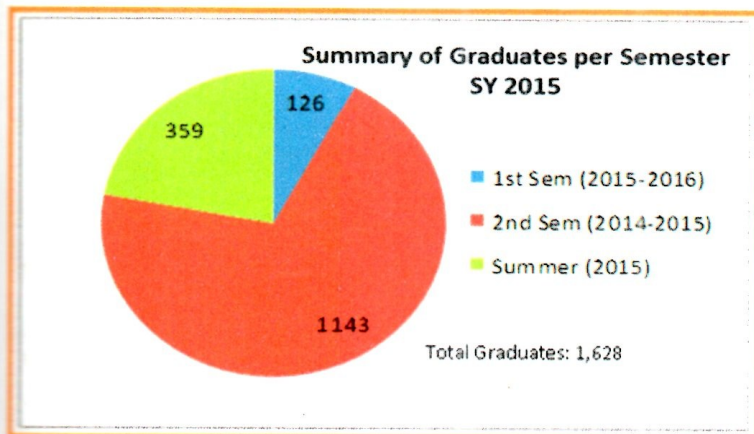

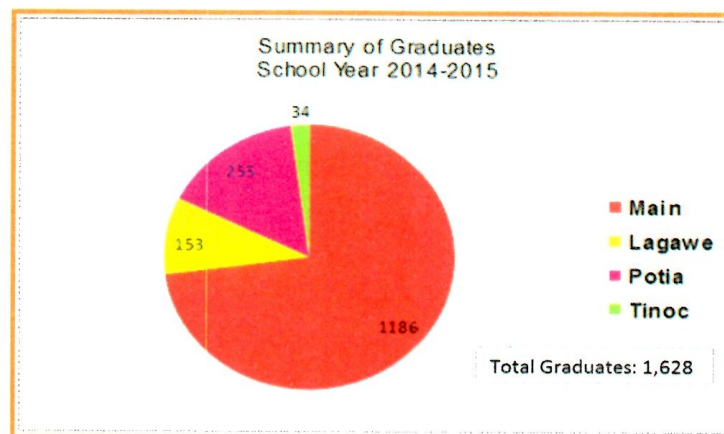
Graph 3 shows the total number of graduates per semester by campus including the ODE/TE graduates in Bangkok, Thailand.

## C. ACCREDITATION

### Percentage of Programs Accredited

This 2015, nine (9) of IFSU's programs were subjected to accreditation by the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACUP).

IFSU has successfully accredited 70% or 28 /40 of its programs, thereby, surpassing its target of 60%. As thus, it has gained a cumulative accomplishment rating in programs accredited of at least 117% for the year in review against SY 2014 of 68% or 27/40.

## D. PERFORMANCE IN LICENSURE EXAMINATION

IFSU has retained its mark of achieving licensure examination rates higher than the National Passing Rate (NPR). Table 7 bares the rates attained by IFSU in the different licensure examinations this 2015.

IFSU has an actual total average passing percentage for SY 2015 of 117% elucidated as 68% of IFSU actual accomplishment over NPR of 58% against SY 2014 actual accomplishment of 119% or 76.85% /64.58% (NPR.).

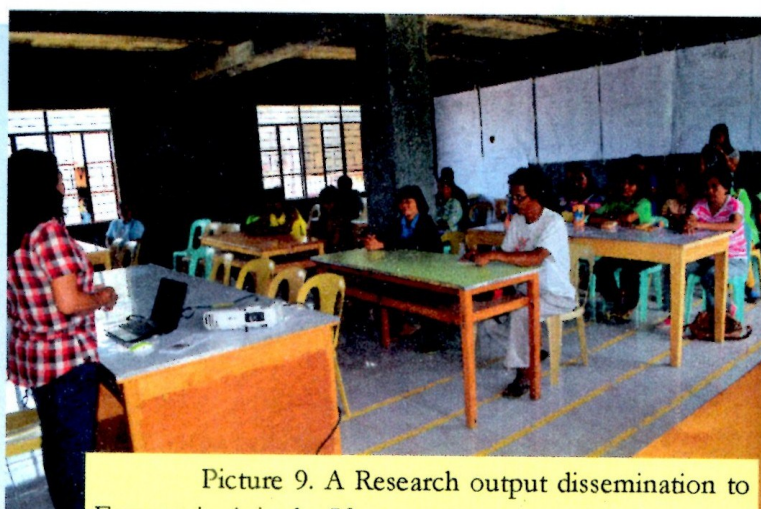

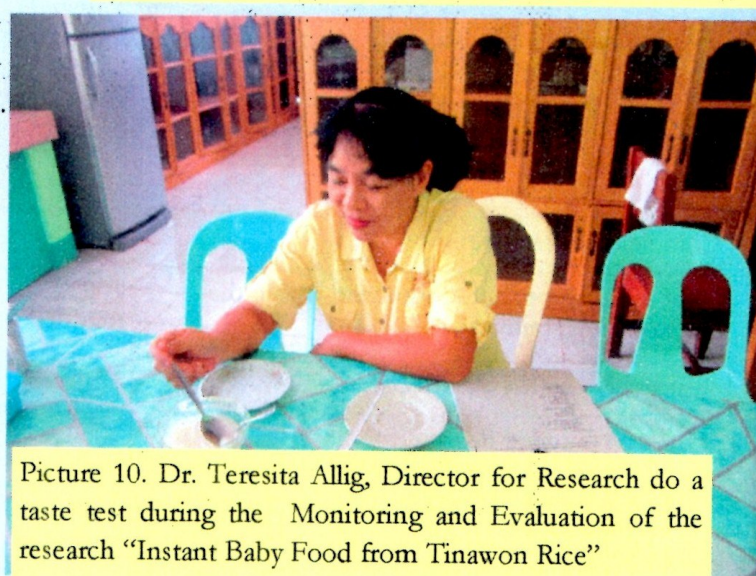

The Extension and Training Services of IFSU remains progressively robust with varied undertaking to aggressively sustain the promotion of knowledge and technology developed by the R and D Department.

This year 2015, the Extension and Training Department accomplished generally its targets under its three major objectives:

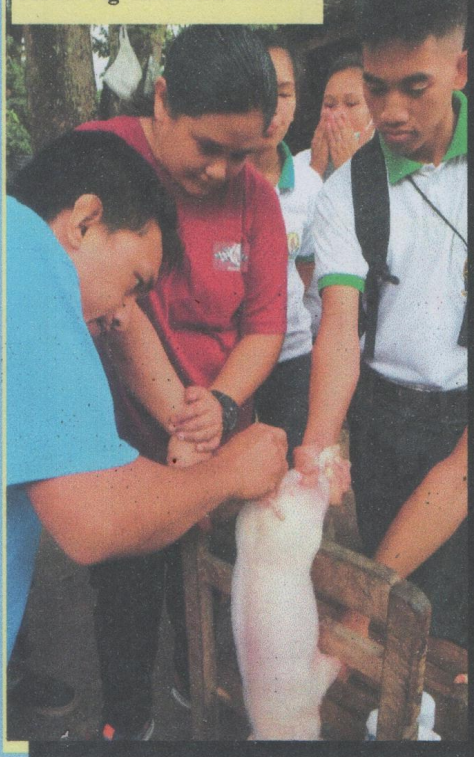

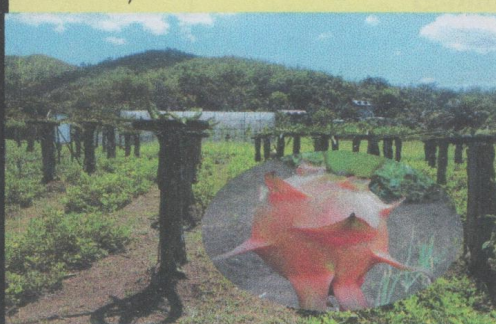

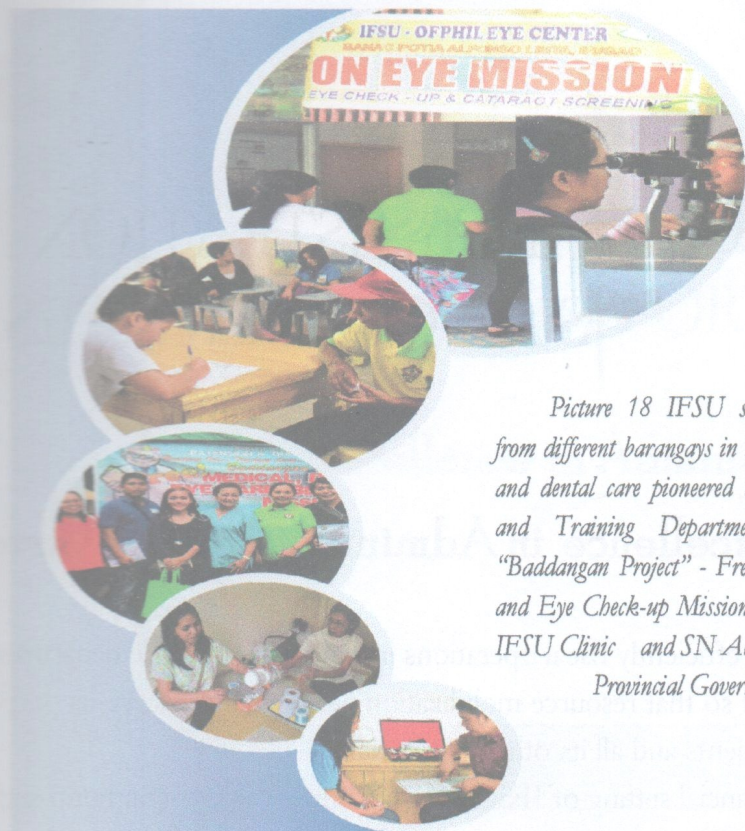

## SPECIAL PROJECTS

### Satoyama Meister Training Program

The Ifugao Satoyama Meister Training Program is a JICA funded special project designed after Noto Satoyama Satoumi Meister Training Project. Its aim is to empower locals in the Globally Important Heritage Systems (GIAHS) Designated Site "Ifugao Rice Terraces" in the Philippines

Spearheaded by the Kanazawa University, the Ifugao Satoyama Meister will strive to improve the quality of life of the Ifugao locals through a harmonize heritage conservation, environmental preservation and economic activities.

For 2015, IFSU is one of the implementing agencies along with the University of the Philippines (UP) and the Provincial Government of Ifugao. This 2015, IFSU pursued the training of 23 apprentice from the heritage sites. The tranees were accorded Lectures on natural farming system, land utilization, management of heirloom rice production, ecological concepts and practices.

Trainees underwent hands-on trainings on food production, native delicacy preparation among others.

The local's training was also reinforced with their travel to Noto, Japan. The visit and interaction with their counterpart trainees in Japan imparted to the Ifugao trainees the Japanese best practices of the Satoyama Meister Training Program.

Permanent Personnel.

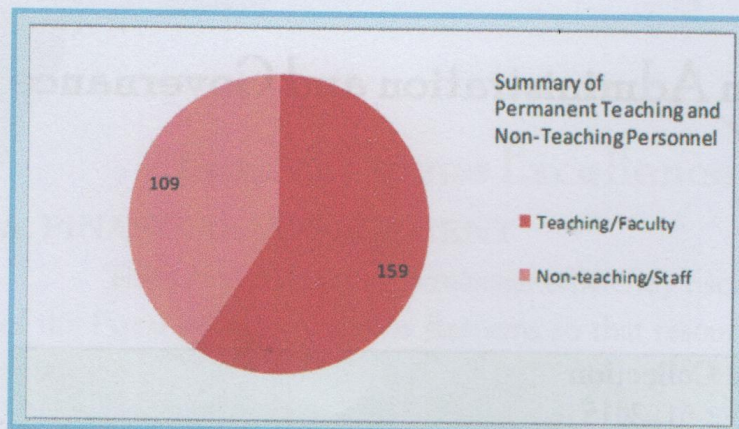


Chart 2: Faculty Profile by Highest Educational Profile.

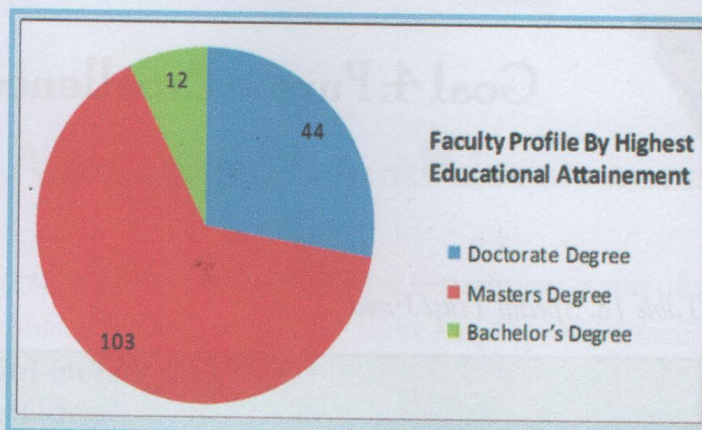
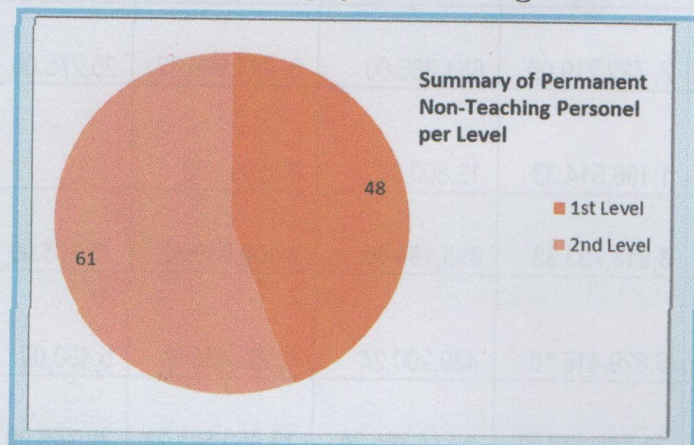


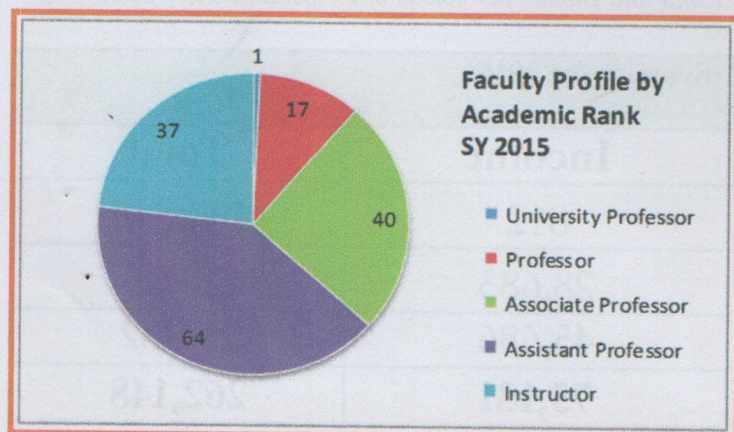
Chart 3. Summary of Non-Teaching IFSU



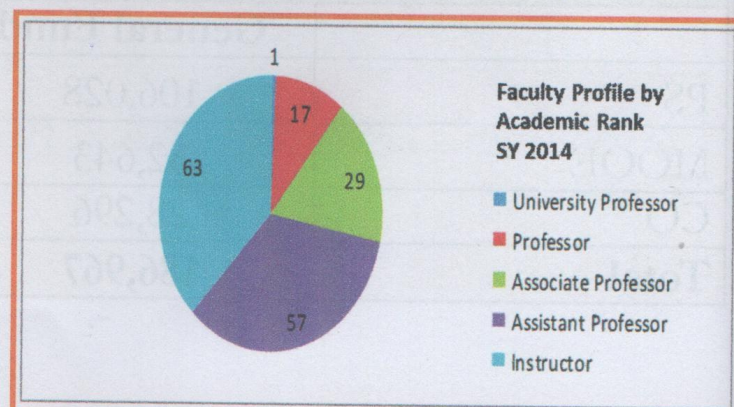

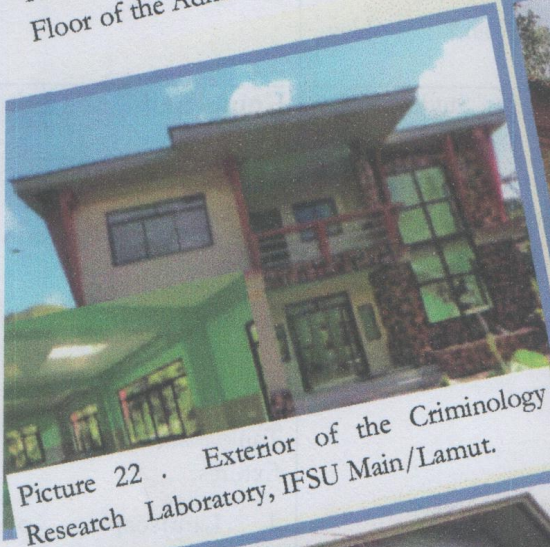

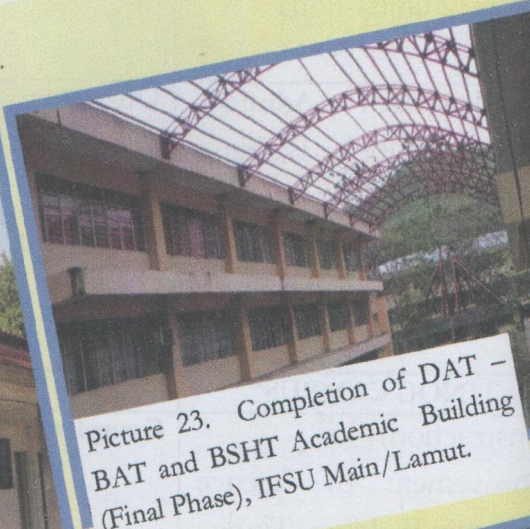

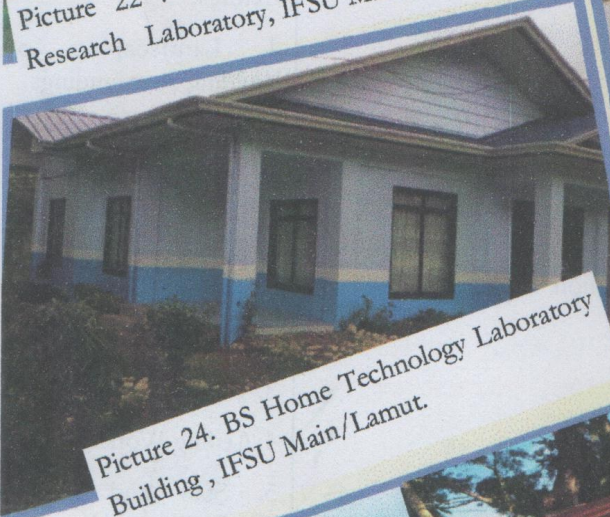

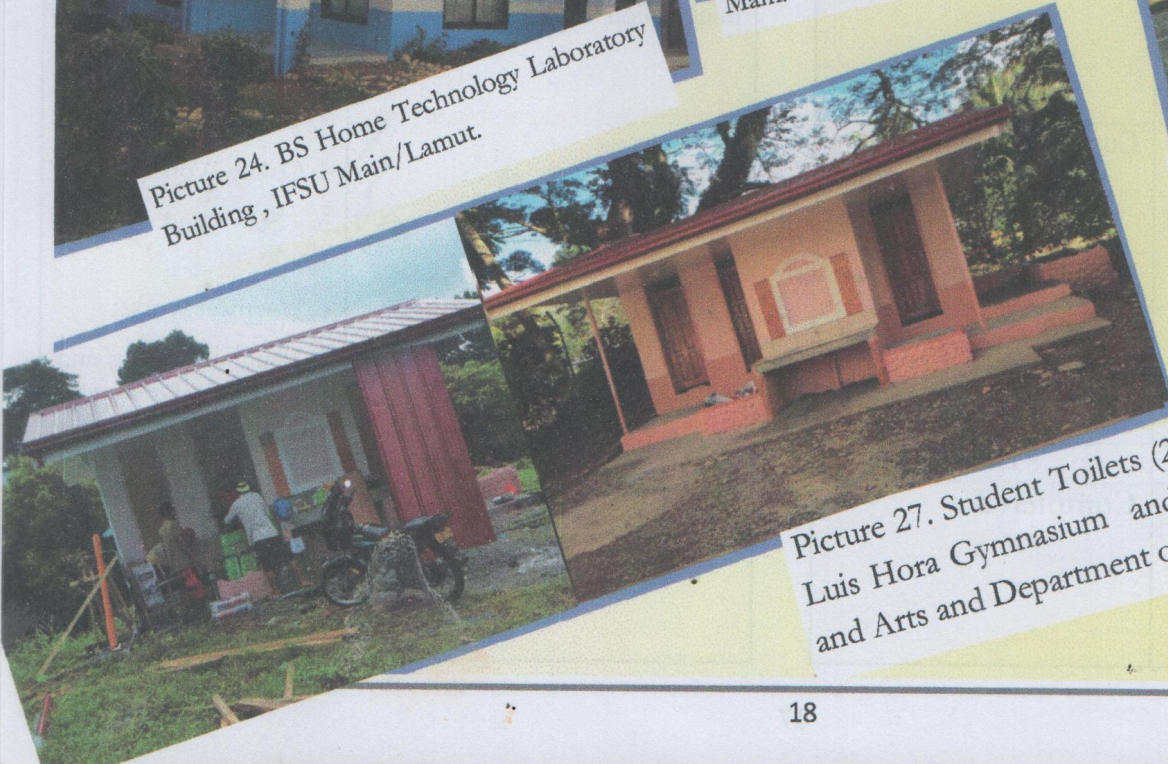

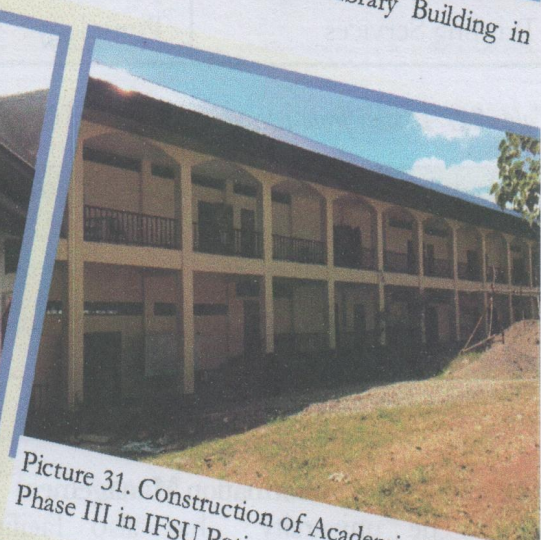

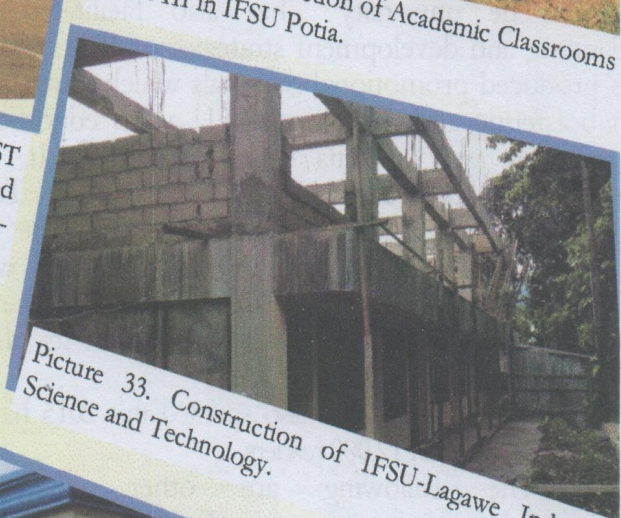

# SUPPORT TO OPERATIONS

Likewise, it finds ways to link-up where financial support for students awaits so that IFSU students will constantly be inspired to carry on their study despite financial challenges. Similarly, IFSU also delivers of health and dental services to ensure that students perform well with a sound mind and body.

IFSU managed to realize its plans for student services for 2015 as shown below.

## A GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING SERVICES

Under this strategic priority, IFSU has conducted 7 career and placement orientation services to graduating baccalaureate students, student applicants and all freshmen students.

The above said provisions given to graduating students included orientation and seminar on Career and Pre-employment, Labor Market Information and Education, Career Development, Job Placement, Recruitment and Job Interview in partnership with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE),

Philippine Overseas Employment Agency (POEA), Provincial Employment and Services Office (PESO), Philippine National Police.

Also, the conduct of assessment of student services was achieved with 1,253 respondents comprised by graduating and junior students. Significantly, 92.2% of these student respondents all across IFSU campuses rated the student services as good/better/best by way of a structured terminal interview survey form.

Alongside these, the university realized its services of conducting entrance examinations to all incoming freshmen and special orientation to transfer-ees, counseling services to walk-in and referred students.

There were 1,076 examinees who took the entrance examination for SY 2015-2016; 116 job applicants took the Psychometric Evaluation.

The purchase of four sets of updated standardized Psychological Test Materials for Psychometric Evaluation is one of the major highlights of the Guidance and Counseling Section for SY 2015-2016.

## B. MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES

The University Clinic served a total of 9,302 student/patients for SY 2015-2016 up by 82% from SY 2014 of 5,114 students.

The regular proper health and sanitation campaigns and information dissemination in the IFSU campuses as well as the inspection of student dormitories and boarding houses has also been implemented.

Graph 7. Summary of student grantees in the last three years against total no. of enrollees.

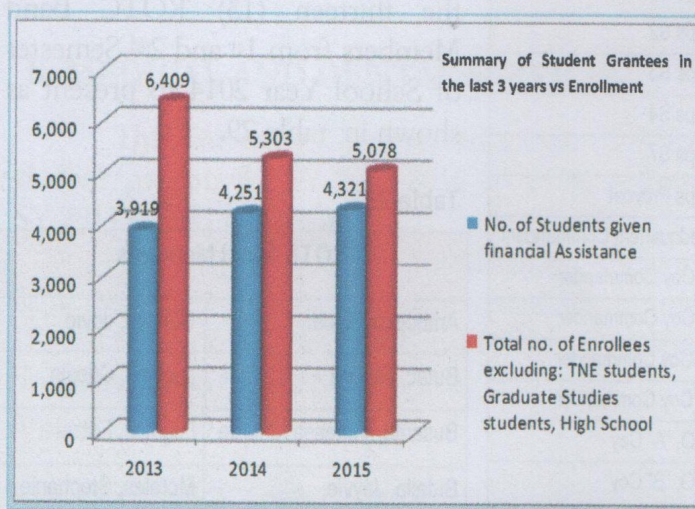

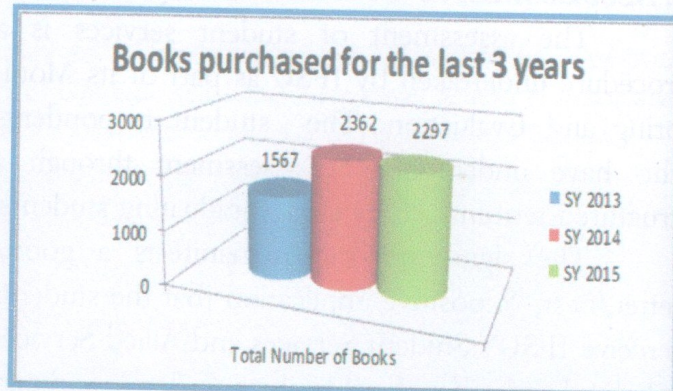

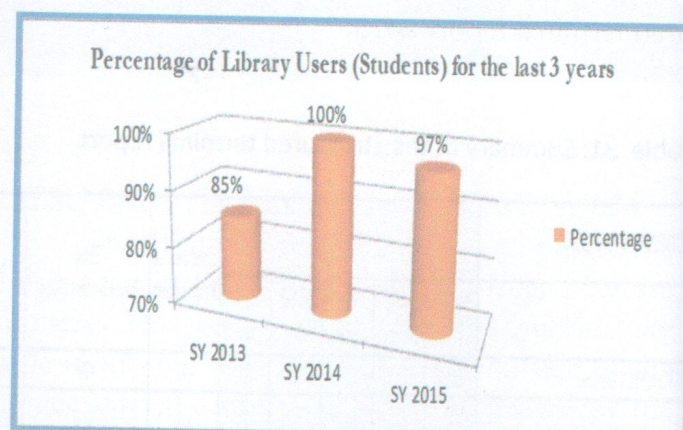

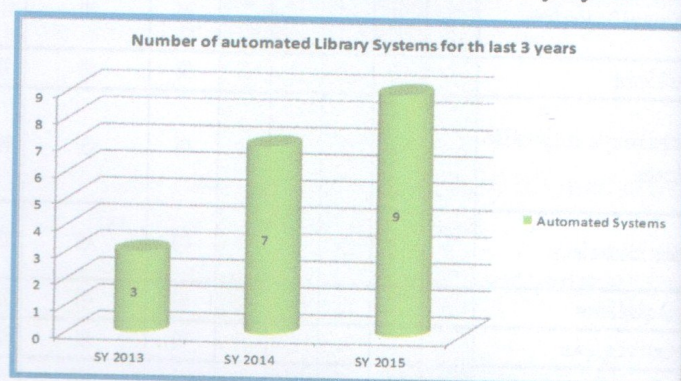
Graph 7: Purchased Books
