The Ifugao State University (IFSU) presents through this Annual Report 2016 its achievements in its continued effort to respond to its mandates as per RA 9720 and the University's Development Plan.

This 2016, IFSU has vigorously implemented its major programs and projects and produced the Major Final Outputs (MFOs) specified as MFO I: Higher Education Services, MFO II: Research Services, and MFO III: Technical Advisory Services as well as outputs for its Support to Operations (STO) and General Administration and Support Services (GASS).

MFO I: Advanced and Higher Education Services

Licensure Examination

This 2016, IFSU retains its good overall performance in Licensure Examinations having higher rates than the National Passing Rate (NPR).

The actual accomplishment of IFSU's first time takers is 12% higher than in CY 2015. Actual accomplishment is 129% for AY 2016 over CY 2015 of 117%.

TESDA Assessment

Overall, IFSU students had a 100% passing rate in 5 programs and 95% passing rate in 2 programs on Frontline Services.

Accreditation

There were 9 course programs that were subjected for evaluation to the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities (AACCUP). Nine (9) of the programs passed and obtained various accreditation levels. As of the year end of 2016, 29 programs are accredited in various Levels I-III while one (1) achieved Candidate Level Status.

CHED Evaluation

There are 16 IFSU Course Programs that were awarded Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) by the Commission Higher Education (CHED) after complying to quality standards set by the commission.

Graduates

IFSU produced 2,093 graduates in priority and mandated programs. The total of graduates for AY 2015-2016 exceeds AY 2014-2015 by 26%.

Enrollment

For the AY 2016-2017, there was a total of 6,224 who enrolled in the 1st semester and 5,865 during the 2nd semester. The decline in number of enrollees during the 2nd semester is a regular circumstance in the university.

Enrollment mean for AY 2016-2017 is 6,044 which is 14.80% lower to mean in 2015-2016 of 7,094. The decline is due to the effect of the K-12 program which was implemented this year.

Also, three (3) modules i.e. Online (OL) Access of Grades, OL Assessment and Scheduling have been completed for CY 2016 in the continuing construction of systems of Registrar.

STO or Support to Operations

National Service Training Program (NSTP) Services

There were 37 outreach programs implemented and also produced 217 graduates.

Under ROTC, there were 436 graduates, Potia campus ROTC outdid challenges and is Top 3 in the Regional Annual Administrative Tactical Inspection for AY 2016.

PE and Sports

The department has persists in coaching and training students towards the discovery and harnessing of their sports skills.

For CY 2016, there were 36 students who qualified and vied in national competitions.

Library Services

Consistent with planned targets, (4) automated systems are now functional at the Library. There were also various improvements such higher internet bandwidth, infrastructure and supplementary books and materials introduced and purchased in the different Campus Libraries corresponding to recommendations as a result of accreditation.

Guidance and Counselling

There were 21 Career Placement activities completed for CY 2016.

Student Publication

The IFSU student journalists made it to Top 5 in the 2016 Higher Education Regional Press Conference. There are 104 IFSU students who underwent journalism training under professional journalists.

Student Organizations

There are 22 activities achieved by student organizations. A 95.91 good/better/best rating was accorded them by clients.

Student Housing Services

Students have availed of IFSU housing with 413 accommodated in the different campuses.

Alumni

The creation of eight (8) alumni directories and the undertaking of a Tracer Study for CY 2015 graduates highlight the accomplishment of this section.

Scholarship Services

There are 72% of IFSU students who are scholarship grantees. There was also an increase of 15% of students in priority courses who are scholarship grantees. Also, an increase of 2% of student grantees graduated AY 2015-2016.

Socio - Cultural Affairs

There are eight (8) activities attended by IFSU students where they displayed cultural presentation. Meanwhile there were four (4) national competitions where IFSU students performed.

Ten Outstanding Students of the Philippines (TOSP

Michelle Binwag made it through the Regional Screening and mad it to Top 30 for the national Finals of the 2016 TOSP.

IFSU OJT

There are 65 Diploma in Agricultural Technology (DAT)- Bachelor in Agricultural Technology (BAT) sent for the dynamic 11-month OJT in Israel coming from the different IFSU Campuses.

This 2016 marks the highest number of slots given to IFSU compared to 41 slots in CY 2015.

Student Exchange Program

IFSU takes pride in the international exposure given to its students taking up Agriculture thereby helping them get a speedy processing and acceptance of seven (7) IFSU students and graduates to the Communicating Agricultural Exchange Program in the different states of America.

MFO II: Research Services

IFSU remains resilient in its research component despite various challenges. This CY 2016 reveals an upsurge in researches, publications and presentations most especially in National and International arena. The increased veracity of IFSU research has also caused an increase in number of externally funded projects with a total 27 researches. A continuing development is the patenting and copyrighting of R&D works by the Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines (IPO). There are nine 11 Utility Models which were issued certification as compared to a total of 9 in CY 2015 and six (6) were successfully conferred copyright registry this year in review.

MFO III: Technology Advisory Services

In the Extension and Training, IFSU has endeavored to capacitate the Ifugao people by extending various trainings and workshops that proved beneficial in the improvement of the lives of the Ifugao people.

GASS or General Administration and Support Services

Income Generating Projects

IFSU has managed credibly its Income Generating Projects (IGPs) as it endeavored in intensifying said area drawing a total income of at least P1.4M from the generated sales of P6M.

Administration and Governance

IFSU has endeavored to address all its concerns through proficient management. It has judiciously disbursed its funds to facilitate and sustain operations of the institution and making sure its stakeholders are well served as evidenced by the university's attainment of its MFO's targets.

A functional human resource has always been the prime focus of the institution. Hence, IFSU has made sure it sustains and enhances its employees through progressive learning by supporting their academic journey to excellence.

Significant Infrastructure and site development projects were implemented owing to an increased capital outlay fund of more than Php103.5 M compared to CY 2015 amounting to Php73M.

Guided by a clear direction and a solid effort, IFSU shall continue to rise and become an Academic Center of Excellence (ACE). IFSU marks this CY 2016 as a challenging year and treads forward with optimism and potency to year 2017.

IFSU remains in command in achieving licensure examination rates higher than the National Passing Rate (NPR).

IFSU's average licensure passing percentage for first time takers is 29% higher than the NPR for CY 2016.

This year in review's accomplishment rate of 129% improved from CY 2015's 117% rate.

IFSU BIG State University Also, an graduate in Bachelor of Science in Criminology was Top 9 in the April 2016 Licensure Examination for Criminology as shown in the photo (right).

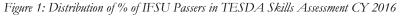

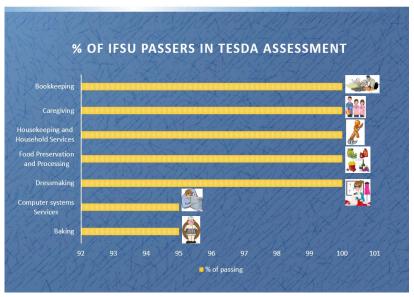

ACCREDITATION

Programs Accredited

This 2016, 9 IFSU programs of the different campuses were subjected to accreditation to the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP).



IFSU has successfully accredited 73% or 30/41 of its programs, thereby, surpassing its target of 68%.

As thus, it has gained a cumulative accomplishment rating in programs accredited of at least 107% for the year in review against CY 2015 of 70% or 28/40.

PROGRAMS ASSESSED CY 2016

Specifically, there were seven (7) undergraduate course programs assessed, 5 have obtained higher levels, one (Bachelor of Agricultural Technology) will have to undergo re-assessment and one (BEE-Tinoc Campus) has acquired Candidate Status and will be prepared for evaluation for Level I. Likewise, two (2) graduate programs have acquired higher levels this year.

GRADUATES

IFSU has produced a total of 2,093 graduates in priority and mandated programs. Compared with target, IFSU's percentage of graduates increased by 26% this CY 2016.

Respectively, 84% ` of the graduates come from the Priority Courses compared to CY 2015 which is at 68%.

Increase in the number of graduates was fostered by the improved number of graduates in Bachelor of Science in Criminology and priority ODE/TE programs.

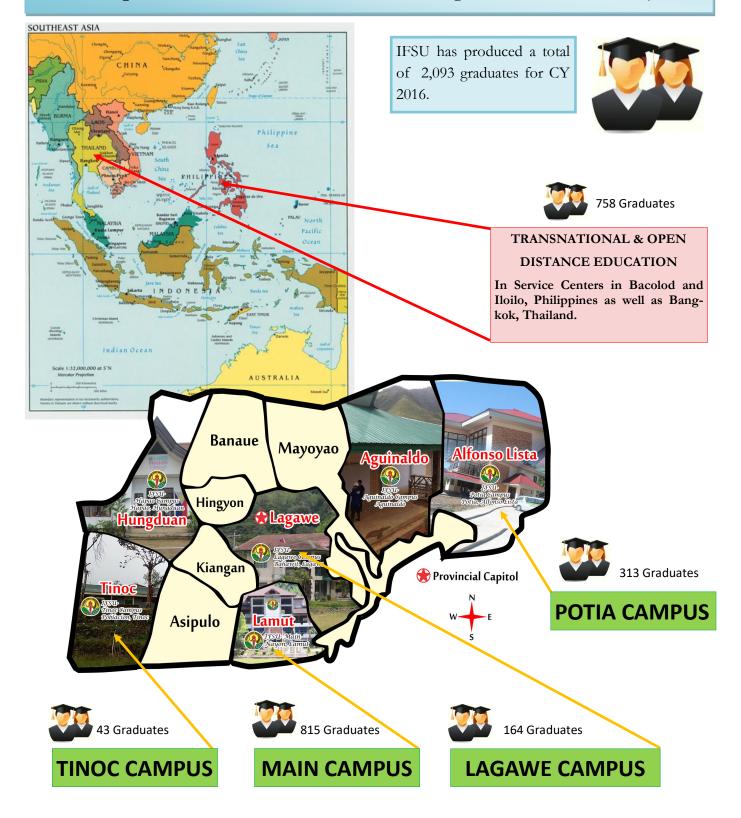

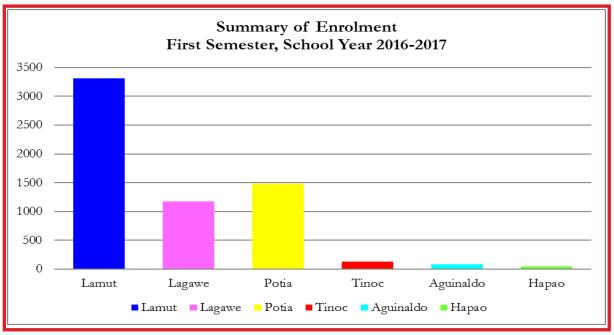
ENROLLMENT

This AY 2016-2017, an average of 6,044 enrolled in IFSU. There were 6,224 (1st Semester) and 5,865 (2nd Semester) enrollees who were registered in the different IFSU campuses and service centers locally and overseas as shown in Graph 1.

Significantly, IFSU opened its classes for AY 2016-2017 in the month of August parallel to modifications implemented in higher education in the country.

IFSU continued to attract more and more students in the Master's and Doctorate Degree Programs through its Open Distance and Transnational Education (ODE/TNE) approach with two semester average enrollment of 656. On the part of College of Advanced Education (CAE) which caters to campusbased students average enrollment is 382 higher by 22% than last year.

In summary, the total mean enrollment of 6,044 for AY 2016-2017 is 14.80% lower to AY 2015-2016 mean enrolment of 7,094 due to the full swing implementation of the K-12 Program which set off the Senior High School thereby affecting the number of admissions of regular freshmen entrants succesively upon completion in high school.

The system is a continuing project of the department aimed at providing their services in an online platform.

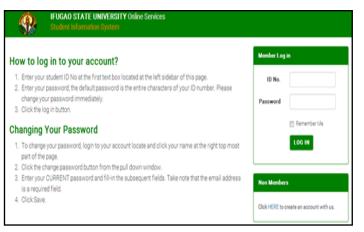


Photo shows the interface of the IFSU Registrar Online Service found at http://my.ifsu.edu.ph/index.php launched in AY 2016-2017.

NATIONAL SERVICE TRAINING PROGRAM (NSTP) SERVICES

The NSTP lingers on with its mandate "to provide civic education and defense preparedness program" for IFSU students.

This CY 2016, IFSU NSTP has successfully implemented their programs under its two (2) components on Civic Welfare Training Service (CWTS) and Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC).

Civic Welfare Training Service (CWTS)

The IFSU

CWTS implemented at least 37 outreach activities beyond its target of 16 to the different barangays in the municipalities of Ifugao.

The CWTS has yielded 217 graduates for AY 2016-2017.





Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC)

Under the ROTC component, the students have kept up to their allegiance to discipline as well as contributing to the general welfare of the community.

The IFSU ROTC which owes its strength to strictly applying military education and training has produced 436 graduates this AY 2016-17.

It was also able to prompt activities of various types in fulfillment of their civic duties such as Tree Planting, Blood Letting, support to Brigada Eskewla and other invitation to other Civic programs by partner agencies.

Remarkably, Potia Campus ROTC Unit, with the participation of the Aguinaldo Campus cadets was Top 3 with a score of 99.387 in the Re-



gional Annual Administrative Tactical Inspection (RAATI) held on January 20, 2016.

PE and SPORTS SERVICES

The PE and Sports Department endeavors to lead students to learn the art and discipline of the games and eventually generating from the students the cream of the crop who will compete for the glory of IFSU.

There were 36 students who qualified for

the national competitions particularly in the Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC) for CY 2016.

LIBRARY SERVICES

The IFSU Library has enabled four (4) automated systems vs its target of one (1) this CY 2016 that are now functional and aiding students in their primary library needs.

The Online Services include Online Collection, LAN to Web based Public Access Catalogue, Online View of Services, Acquisitions and Archives.

In compliance to set standards by accrediting bodies, IFSU has upgraded its other areas of services like i.e. acquisition at least 808 books of varied titles, enhancement of facilities with the incorporation of a Library Coffee Shop specifically at the IFSU Main Campus.

The internet service has also been upgraded to a higher bandwidth speed of 2.00 + mbps direct connection for better internet service

Subsequently, the IFSU Library has

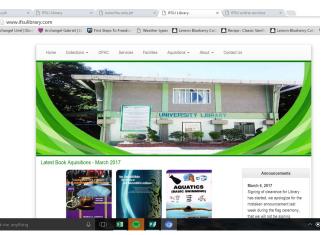

• Ten Outstanding Students in the Philippines (TOSP)

Michelle Binwag, an IFSU graduate in Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education is one of the 30 National Finalists in the on-going Search for Ten Outstanding Students in the Philippines (TOSP) 2016.

As a national finalist, Binwag participated in the TOSP National Week Activities which consists of a three-day formation program, outreach and exposure activities on a schedule to be set by the organizers.



Binwag and the other national finalists will individually undergo an inter-

view before a five-member panel of judges convened by the National Executive Committee (NEXECOM) during the national week. The selection of the top ten students occurs after this stage.

• IFSU on the Job Training

Sixty-five Diploma in Agricultural Technology - Bachelor in Agricultural Technology (DAT-BAT) students were approved for the Agro-Studies On the Job Training to Israel on different scheduled flights in CY 2016.

Three students are from Hapao Campus, 24 from Potia Campus and 38 from the Main Campus.

This CY 2016 slots have increased from the forty-one slots acquired by the university in 2015.

The 11-month course or OJT in Israel will give an opportunity to the IFSU students to work in the modern farms, expose them to the latest agrobased technology and will allow them to learn advance agricultural working methods. Parallel to their vision which is "to interconnect our world peacefully through our paid agriculture exchange programs in order for our participants to identify themselves as world citizens transcending from any geographical, cultural or political borders" IFSU was able to seize the opportunity for its students because of the international experience provided by IFSU's OJT practice of its students in Israel since one of the requirements is international exposure.

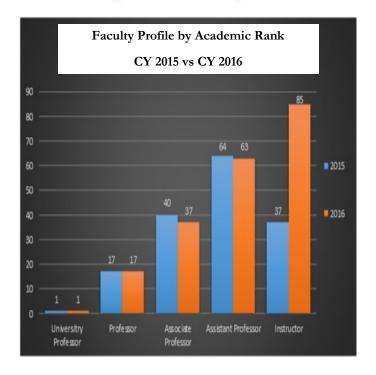

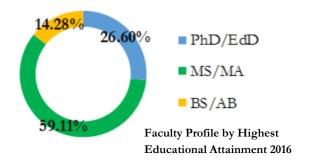
